TO START WORK AT MENNONITE CAMP SITE.

Work plotting and beautifying the Mennonite Camp grounds, just South of B.C., chosen sometime ago by the denomination, as the permanent location for the annual camp meeting, will begin soon.

Carl Rasmussen of Marlette, who has had training in landscape gardening, will assist in laying out the grounds. Work this Summer will consist mainly of marking out and graveling roads and other general improving and beautifying. Plans now under way will be submitted to the State Conference in June for ratification.

Construction of cottages and main buildings is not expected to be started until next Spring, as the first camp meeting will be held on the permanent site in 1929.

The meeting this year will again be held in Yale and an agreement with that place to hold a certain number of meetings there,

will have been terminated.

APPOINTMENTS MADE AT MENNONITE CONFERENCE COMMITTEE NAMED TO GET CAMP GROUNDS READY.

Among the important business that came before the conference was that regarding the permanent camp site, located south west of Brown City. The entire matter was left in the hands of a committee of 11 appointed for the purpose. It will be their business to see that the 1929 camp meeting, which will be the first one held at the new camp. Local members of the committee are: Rev. W. O. Cline, Amos Detweiler, and Joseph Witmer.

Aug. 23, 1928

The annual camp meeting of the MI Conference of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ, opened at Yale, Fri. Aug. 17, and will continue through Monday, Aug. 27. The main speakers at the sessions, which annually attract thousands, are Rev. R. P. Ditmer, noted evangelist of Springfield, OH, and Rev. J. B. Sherk, missionary home from Africa on furlough. Rev. Ditmer is well known here, having conducted a revival at the local church last Spring. Rev. Sherk, who is also widely known, is a member of the Canadian Conference. Other speakers include ministers of the MI Conference.

The meetings are being well

attended, a record crowd gathering at the camp grounds Sunday.

This is the last year that the camp will be held at Yale. In 1929 the permanent camp site, located south of Brown City, will be in readiness and the annual gathering will be held there in the future.

MENNONITES TAKE FINAL ACTION ON CAMP SITE.

Final action, taken at the Mennonite Camp meeting at Yale resulted in the definite fixing of the grove on Joseph Witmer farm just south of B.C., as the site for the permanent camp grounds of the denomination.

Work of preparing the camp for the 1929 meeting will be under way soon. Arrangements for lighting and water will be made, the grounds plotted and other necessary improvements undertaken.

The 1928 camp meeting at Yale was a very successful one both in point of numbers in attendance and in the interest manifested. Larger crowds than ever before were said to have attended the sessions which were most inspiring.

Rev. Ditmer of Youngstown, OH was the main speaker.

Young people's and children's meetings which are a new feature of the camp program, aroused a great deal of interest.

COMMITTEE TO PLAN FOR MENNONITE CAMP.

Next Monday Sept. 10, the first step will be taken in the development of the permanent camp site of the MI Conference of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ, situated on Joseph Witmer farm southwest of B.C.

The 11 members of the camp development committee will hold an all-day session on the site that date and formulate a definite plan of action.

Plotting of the camp, marking out of streets, arrangements for lights and water, and other matters necessary to put the camp into condition for the 1929 meeting, will be discussed and decided upon. Some work is expected to be done this fall.

Local members of the committee are Rev. W.O. Cline, Amos Detweiler, M.W. Frey and Joseph Witmer, Rev. Eastman of Yale is Secretary-treasure of the organization.

Mennonites Draw Up Plans For New Comp.

COMMITTEE MEETS AT SITE MONDAY - PLOTS GROUNDS-TO START WORK SEPT. 24.

At an all-day meeting of the Mennonite Camp grounds on the Witmer farm, S of B.C., Monday, the 11 members of the camp development committee made definite plans for the improvement and preparation of

The site.

The location of the tabernacle, store house and well and the plotting of the ground were decided upon and the committee compose of Rev. O.P. Eastman of Yale and Rev. R.G. Morgan of Port Huron appointed to draw up blue prints.

A representative of the MI Power Company was present and plans were made to extend electric line to camp. An order has been given to have this done at least 40 days previous to May 1, 1929.

Frank McDonald has been awarded the contract for drilling the well.

The next meeting of the committee will be held Monday. Sept. 24, when the blue prints will be ready. Stakes will be driven, and the work of building roads, etc., will be started.

It is planned to have a circular road at least 200 ft. From the tabernacle so the noise of cars will not disturb services. Inside this will be a boulevard. Parking space has also been provided for.

The choosing of this community for permanent location of the Mennonite Camp means much to B.C., as an annual meetings attract hundreds of people. The project is worthy of the support of the entire community.

MENNONITE CAMP SITE IS BEING IMPROVED.

Several trees standing where the tabernacle is to be built were cut down and the space cleared up.

The work of staking out roads was nearly completed, and it is the intention to do considerable road building this fall and early winter.

The committee also decided to erect a 28 x 46 storage building this fall.

WELL DRILLED AT MENNONITE CAMP.

Drilling of the well at the Mennonite permanent Camp site south of B.C. Has been completed. A flow of good water was reached at a depth of 209 ft. The well was drilled by Frank McDonald.

Other work has been going on at the site. The roads have



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Been staked off and a spot cleared for the tabernacle. It is planned to accomplish as much as possible on the grounds before the cold weather sets in.

WORK IS RESUMED AT MENNONITE CAMP SITE.

The fine weather this week has made it possible for work to be resumed on the new storehouse, being constructed at the Mennonite Camp grounds S. Of B.C. A crew is busy, under the direction of Rev. Cline, but more help can be used on the building and on other work, and all who can find it possible to aid are urged to do so.

2ND BUILDING STARTED - COMMITTEES GETTING PREPARATIONS FOR OPENING WELL UNDER WAY

Work at the Mennonite Camp site, halted by "Old Man Winter," has been resumed and is going on apace, according to Rev. W.O. Cline, in charge of activities

The storage house almost completed last fall is expected to be finished this week and the pump house has been started.

Arrangements have been made with the MI Power Co. For the extension of lines to the camp and electric lights are to be installed within 30 days.

Committees appointed for various special tasks such as plotting the grounds, deciding on the type of cottages to be built, selling of lots, etc., are at work and everything is getting into shape for the opening of the camp in July.

Buildings, it has been decided, will be painted battleship grey with white trimmings and the camp promises to present an attractive appearance in its woodland setting.

The dwelling house on the grounds has been turned over by the owner. Mr. Joseph Witmer, for a dining hall to accommodate those in attendance at the meetings. Anyone interested in taking charge of this activity, that is the serving of meals, during camp season, is asked to get in touch with Rev. W.O. Cline.

Work Advances At Mennonite Camp Site. ROADS UNDER CONSTRUCTION - PUMP AND TANK TO BE INSTALLED NEXT WEEK - BUSINESS MEN CONTRIBUTE.

Work is nearing completion at the Mennonite Camp grounds S.W. Of B.C. Crews of workers have been busy and the grove is beginning to take on the appearance of a real camp site.

The store house is finished, the well is down and a 1,000-gallon pressure tank and pump are expected to be installed the first

of next week.

The task of clearing out underbrush is about completed and road construction is well underway. D. Youngs was awarded the contract for the graveling of the roads, and the drive from the road to the store house is nearly finished. About 200 loads of dirt have been taken from the roadside and leveled off in front of the woods and the making of a circular drive is well underway.

Drainage has been taken care of, about 1,000 four - inch tile having been laid.

The completion of the above tasks the construction of two buildings and the leveling of the campus, must be finished before the camp meeting which is scheduled for Aug.

Brown City merchants have contributed liberally to the advancement of the work. A canvass of the town was made Wed. And the response was generous. The names of all those who contributed will be read at the camp meeting in Aug.

RUSHING WORK AT MENNONITE CAMP.

Work at the Mennonite Camp site S. Of B.C. Is being rushed to completion is readiness for the annual state meetings which opens there Aug. 15 and continues through the 25th.

The cement floor has been laid in the storeroom and finishing



touches are being put on that building. Electric wiring is being done, now, also roads are being completed, and the camp begins to present a very attractive appearance.

Situated in the beautiful grove on the Joseph Witmer farm, the camp is an ideal spot for gatherings of this kind.

A meeting of the general committee in charge of the camp activities, consisting of seven members, headed by Rev. W.O. Cline, was held at the grounds, Monday, to further the work. It was probably the last session of the committee before the sessions open.

young people's meeting 4:30 p.m.; Song and Praise service 7 p.m.; Evangelistic services, 8:00 p.m.

A section of the big store house recently completed on the site, is being fitted up as a cafeteria for the accommodation of those in attendance at the meetings.

CAMP MEETING TO OPEN HERE ON AUGUST 16.

Mennonites To Hold Ten-day Service At New Grounds South Of Town---Large Crowds Expected.

Final preparations are being made for the annual Mennonite State Camp meeting, which opens at the new camp site, southwest of B.C., next Friday, Aug. 16, and continues through the 25th.

Here in the beautiful and quiet grove of the Joseph Witmer farm, divine services will be held, undisturbed by the distractions of a more public spot.

Hundreds of visitors from all parts of the state are expected to attend and a splendid program has been outlined.

A prayer service at 6:30 a.m., opens the day. This is followed by Bible study at 9:30; Children's service and fellowship meeting at 2 p.m.; Young people's meeting at 4:00 p.m.; Preaching at 3 p.m.; Song and prayer service at 7:30 p.m.; Evangelical service at 8 p.m.

Rev. Jacob Hygema, Bible teacher and evangelist of Ft. Wayne, Ind., and Mr. & Mrs. Willard Hallman, evangelist singers

Of Chicago, are the special workers. Rev. J.S. Wood of Pontiac will be in charge of the camp.

The camp is about in readiness to receive the visitors. Electric wiring has been completed and the lighting system will feature two flood lights which will shine out over the tabernacle.

The cafeteria, where meals will be served, is being fitted up in one section of the big store house. Mrs. Dell Shrier and Mrs. George Cunningham will be the cooks.

Tents and beds are furnished, campers, and the tenant house on the Witmer farm is also being made ready as a rooming house.

Wm. Martin is erecting a model cottage on the grounds which will be used by the evangelist during the meetings, and at the close will be sold.

Among a few other things that yet remain to be done before the opening of the services is the laying of water pipe lines to various parts of the grove, for the convenience of those who attend.

As the first convocation at the new site will be something in the nature of a dedication, a record crowd is expected.

Already many people are arriving from many parts of the state for the annual Mennonite

Last minuet preparations are being rushed to completion and everything will be in readiness for the visitors Friday. Fine all-day programs have been arranged for each day of the 10-day meet and large crowds are expected to be in attendance.

MENNONITE CAMP MEETINGS ATTRACTING LARGE CROWDS.

First Gathering At New Camp Big Success - Pastor Who Started Work In MI Speaks.

The first meeting ever held by the Mennonites at their new permanent camp site, the beautiful grove on the Joseph Witmer farm southwest of B.C., promises to go down in the history of the church as one of the most successful and inspiring ever held.

Big crowds from all parts of MI and points in IN, and Canada have been in attendance at the sessions since the opening, last Friday. Sunday was the big day and next Sunday, the closing day, is expected to see a record attendance.

There are 86 tents pitched on the grounds and many people have been staying in B.C.

Services began with prayer meeting at 6:30 and continues throughout the day and evening. Evangelist Jacob Hygema, in charge of the Bible study and usually of one of the preaching services each day has been bringing inspiring messages.

Other pastors who assist during the remainder of the camp are Rev. Jacob of Rosenburg; Rev. C.I. Huffman of IN, and Rev. Harvey Frey of Hesper, Ont.

The afternoon a very interesting service was held, inspired by the presence of Rev. Peter Cober, of Kitchener, Ont., aged pastor who sowed the seed that resulted in the establishment of the Mennonite denomination in MI. Mr. Cober recalled that the MI denomination had it's birth in this community under his leadership, just 48 years ago. The first services were held in Deanville school, with 11 Charter members, all of who now are dead save Mrs. Geo. Burkholder. Mr. Cober marveled at the fact that from this small beginning the faith had spread throughout the state and that less than 50 years later, he should be addressing so large an assemblage.

His talk was inspiring and encouraging, showing the progress that has been made and pointing to a promising future.

It is a strange coincidence that the site of the permanent camp should be that on which the first camp meeting, ever to take place in MI, was held 40 years ago.

3000 ATTEND MENNONITE CAMP ON CLOSING DAY.

Sunday Marks End Of One Of Most Successful Meetings Ever Held - Permanent Site Pleases.

Sunday marked the close of one of the best and most successful camp meetings ever held by MI Mennonites, both in point of numbers in attendance and in the fine spirit that pervaded the gathering.

Crowds attended all the meetings and Sunday afternoon a record gathering of more than 3,000 assembled. Over 90 tents were pitched on the grounds, the largest number in several years.

The success of this first meeting at the new permanent camp site, in the grove on the Joseph Witmer farm, southwest of B.C., is highly gratifying to the camp committee, of which Rev. W.O. Cline is a member.

Because of his nearness to the site, most of the responsibility for the preparation of the grounds rested on Rev. Cline and much credit is due him for his untiring efforts.

The ten-day meetings were featured by six inspirational services daily, at nearly every spirit one of which there were seekers at the altar. Evangelist Hygema, whose inspired messages and Bible study classes were high lights of the sessions, said that never before had he been present at a finer camp meeting, a meeting that seemed to be pervaded by a deep spirituality or where the



the people were more enthusiastic and receptive.

Contributions were generous. About \$2,400 was subscribed for the camp grounds and \$1,017 was raised for the general expenses. That people were pleased with the camp was evidence by the contribution of one man, who gave \$200 because of the excellence of the work already done. He remarked that if preparations had been made in a haphazard manner he would not have given a cent.

The material needs of those in attendance at the meetings were well cared for. Fine meals were served at the cafeteria by Mrs. Geo. Cunningham, Mrs. Dell Shrier, and Mrs. W.O. Cline.

It is the plan to build, as soon as possible, a tabernacle and other permanent structures and if things progress as they should all of the important meetings of the Conference, including not only the camp, but the annual conference and young people's and Sunday school conventions will be held there, making it an almost all-the-year-round proposition.

Attracting as it does, people from all over the state, the location of the camp here is a big thing for Brown City and the town is indeed fortunate.

Seventy-three lots have already been taken and others will be chosen as soon as the remainder of the grounds has

been plotted, it is reported. Lots are leased with the privilege of building on them. It is expected that at least a dozen cottages will be built before the next camp meeting.

The model cottage built by W.A. Martin, and which was used by Rev. Hygema, has been taken over by the conference and will be used permanently as a home for the evangelist at the meetings.

Some work is to be done on the grounds this fall. The grounds will be smoothed off and the tabernacle site covered with gravel.

Much gravel for roads has been hauled and men are busy with scrapers and tractors, leveling the grounds, which will be seeded in a short time.

CAMP MEETING OPENS AUG.15.

Big Attendance Expected At
Second Convocation Of
Mennonites, At Permanent Site,
Here.

Everything is activity and
bustle at the Mennonite State
Camp site, southwest of Brown
City, where final preparations are
under way for the annual
meetings which open there Aug.
15, and continues through the
24th.

This is only the second year
that the big annual gathering,
which attracts members of the
denomination from all parts of MI
and other states, will have been
there. The beautiful woodland
plot on the Joseph Witmer farm
has been secured as a permanent
campsite, and is being converted
into an attractive retreat.

Improvements completed
this year include the smoothing of
the grounds, graveling of the
tabernacle site, construction of a
fine new cafeteria, work on which
has just been ended, and the
installation of an artistic drinking
fountain and a stone flower box.
The first cottage, which is being
built by a Grand Rapids woman,
is also under construction and will
be finished before the opening of
the camp.

An inspiring and excellent
program has been arranged for the
sessions this season.

3,000 Attend Mennonite
Services Sunday - 113 Tents
Pitched On Grounds - Interest
Keen And Results Good.

The annual state camp
meeting of the Mennonite
Brethren in Christ, which opened
at the permanent camp site just
southwest of the city, last Friday,
bids fair to the biggest ever held
by the denomination.

A hundred and thirteen tents
are pitched under the trees on the
beautiful grounds - the largest

number in the history of the
Mennonite camp.

Sunday around 3,000
people were present at the
services, which was also a record
for the first Sunday of the annual
meetings.

The young people's
sessions, under the direction of
H. Wisewell and the children's
gathering alone.
Interest in all the activities is keen
and good results are being
accomplished.

The camp is an interesting
spot and has taken on the aspect
of a real institution.

The shady grove in which it
is secluded, is an ideal spot and
here a "city of tents," surrounding
the big tabernacle, is set. The
scene reminds one of the martial
language of the O. T, "the army
was encamped round about."

The grounds have been
much improved and the new
cafeteria and two cottages, one of
which was completed this year,
add greatly to the appearance and
feeling of permanence.

A covered drinking
fountain made of vari-colored
stones and a large flower box
constructed of the same
material, and to the artistic effect.
The fountain is lighted at night.

SUCCESS ATTENDS MENNONITE CAMP.

Seekers At Altar Out Number
Those Of Previous Years - Large



Crowds At Services.

The most successful camp meeting, in point of the number of seekers at the altar, ever held by the MI conference of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ, closed at the permanent camp site, S. W. of Brown City, Sunday evening. Crowds estimated at around 3,000 attended the closing services, and attendance all during the sessions of the 10-day meeting was said to have been much larger than in previous years. The great interest aroused was apparent in the many (around 200) who went to the altar.

People from all parts of MI and many places in Ont. gathered for the meetings and the 113 tents pitched on the grounds around the big tabernacle, were said to have been the largest number of any year, except one, since the camp meetings were started, about 33 years ago. One season 115 tents were set up, it is said. This little city of Canvass, which Sunday, presented such an interesting and animated picture, had disappeared Monday, as if by magic, and the 1930 camp had become history. Aug. 28, 1930

Two of the outstanding activities of the camp this year were the young people's and children's meetings in which unusual interest was evident. The former was in charge of H. Wisewell of Pontiac and the latter was conducted by Miss Susie Dean, of Detroit.

Another feature was the large attendance of visitors from the Ont. Conference. These people were the guests of the camp.

Rev. Hygema, of Ft. Wayne, the evangelist of the meetings, an inspiring speaker, brought many to the altar as a result of his messages. He was assisted in the work by the various preachers of the conference. Rev. J. S. Wood of Pontiac had general supervision over the camp and Rev. W. O. Cline, of Brown City, kept the "machinery" running smoothly.

Mr. & Mrs. Hallman, who were in charge of the music and whose singing added much to the impressiveness of the meetings, have already been engaged for next years camp.

This year the young people's meetings were held in the old tabernacle tent, but a movement is now on foot, among the young folks, to build a permanent structure for their sessions. This will probably be completed before the next meeting.

Saturday evening a service which attracted a great crowd was held on Main street by the young people of the camp. Jun. 25, 1931

MENNONITES TO OPEN CAMP FRIDAY.

Ten-Day Services Expected To Attract Record Crowd--- Dr. Huffman Of IN, Will Be Speaker.

Everything is in readiness for the annual Mennonite Camp meeting, which opens at the state camp site, 1 1/2 miles southwest of Brown City tomorrow. Aug. 14, and which is expected to attract the biggest crowd that has ever assembled since this summer convention was instituted more than 30 years ago.
